Mar a deir an seanfhocal "Mol an Óige agus tiocfaidh sí" and that's obvious with the participation of over 2,000 children from Boden Óg upwards who are coached and mentored by so many club volunteers. The world has more distractions and is surely more complicated than when Seamus Heaney wrote of "...four jackets for four goalposts, that was all. The corners and the squares were there like longitude and latitude under the bumpy ground" but through the work of so many

mentors and coaches, the enjoyment of "Youngsters shouting their heads off in a field, As the light died and they kept on playing, Because by then they were playing in their heads" is unchanged.

On the adult playing side, championship victories included intermediate football, U21 hurling, the minor camogie and ladies football double and U21B in mens' football and camogie. While there was disappointment after three Senior A semi-final defeats across the four codes, it's a measure of the club that the aspiration is senior championships and anything less is disappointment.

The management teams led by David Curtin (hurling) and Kenny Naughton (football) left no stone unturned and along with the semi-final appearances, brought their teams to the play off stages of their leagues. Both managers are taking the teams forward next year and with the players available and the experience gained, we look forward to 2023. Terry O'Neill is stepping down as camogie manager and I'd like to thank him for his work in developing our senior camogie set up for the last three years, and getting a talented group of players ever closer to the holy grail. New manager Tom O'Donoghue will leverage this as he takes up the reins. Credit also to the ladies football senior team managed by Stephen Maxwell who, after a tough campaign, finally had almost the entire panel available, and produced their finest performance, on a Wednesday night in Ringsend to secure senior status. I'd like to wish Finnian Hyland every success as he takes over as senior manager.

The Boden Braves players and mentors continue to inspire, as anyone who has visited the Monday evening training sessions will confirm. Started off by Laura Burns along with several of the senior camogie team, the Braves have seen their playing and mentor numbers grow. One parent wrote to express thanks to the club and to the Braves' mentors and, in what was a very moving letter, described the importance of the Braves. I'll quote just a couple of extracts "... one of the most genuinely inclusive initiatives I have encountered ... facilitating the participation of kids who all too often are overlooked, showing them respect ... It really means so much (and possibly a lot more than many of those involved even realise) ... I see it as an "arm around the shoulder" from the wider Boden community."

Fielding the number of teams that we do, and running Ballyboden St. Enda's is a huge endeavour. I've been incredibly fortunate in the people who make up the Club Executive this year (pictured right). They spend unseen hours doing unglamourous work like development, finance, registration, pitch maintenance, attending committees, governance, procedures, player welfare and much more that is often unacknowledged. They joined 'Boden to play, to coach, or to mentor but were persuaded to do work far removed from standing on or beside a pitch. I'm indebted to them because the work they do is critical to the Club. In addition, the chairpersons of the six games sections and their committees have entered teams, engaged county boards, fundraised, organised management teams, sourced equipment and

With the COVID hangover finally waning (we hope), the club can focus on new initiatives. The appointments of Timmy Hammersley (Coaching and Player Development Manager), Seán Óg Boyce (Games Promotion Officer) and Paudie Ó'Neill (Cathaoirleach, Coiste Oiliúna agus Cluichí) brought fresh enthusiasm to our approach to coaching. They've made an incredible start with more to come, and I'm confident a solid foundation is in place which will deliver a pipeline of qualified and talented coaches. An EGM in May approved expenditure on a new all-weather pitch and groundworks on the Carmelite lands, so plenty more work for John Ryan for at least two years, and there's no one better to deliver it. A lot of unseen upgrades to the clubhouse (roofing, plumbing, electricity) were managed by James McGarry. This enabled an upgrade to the ladies dressing rooms to a quality befitting our ladies teams.

The interior decoration was completed by the teams themselves under the guidance of Darren O'Reilly. A forum to understand why there is such a gender imbalance in many areas in the club took place in October, with focus areas now identified for next year. There is untapped talent within the Club and this work is a means to unlock some of it. And most will be aware of the workshops delivered on the Club's values of Respect, Teamwork, Amateurism, Community, Player Welfare and Inclusiveness. New signage will be a reminder of these values, although I was struck by Jim Gavin's comment that when the Club lives the values through the way it behaves every day, no signs will be needed; the values will be be self-evident. I'm still getting the signs, because although we're a long way there, we've still a bit to go.


We had 100% membership participation from 1900 players. I would like to thank the previous registrars and in particular Gerry White for the great work done in the past.

Club Development Activities 2022

Any club member involved in securing planning or upgrading buildings will fully understand the frustration associated with development projects. From the outside it would appear very little is happening. I will try to summarize the key activities underneath:

- 1. Further to EGM earlier in the year we have now got approval to develop further the Sancta Maria building where Sparc presently resides. This will consist of a good size Audio/visual room for team review meetings, extra treatment rooms for Sparc, kitchenette and toilet facilities. A tender document was sent soon after the EGM and builder now appointed. However, this is subject to the successful completion of the sale of Saplings building.
- 2. The sale of Old Convent (Saplings) building is progressing slowly. We have had numerous difficult issues on the contract, but thankfully all are almost complete. We would be very hopeful that sale will close shortly.
- 3. Our members at a specially convened EGM agreed to sign off on the developing of two pitches in Carmelite grounds to include: 2 x Full pitches, own entrance. Considerable time has been vested in securing a cost-effective design plan and now almost ready for the tender process. This was challenging work and needed input from a wide range of professionals.

- 4. The first tender for tree felling and maintenance for Carmelites was sent with a closing date mid-December. The work we hope will be completed by end of February.
- 5. The Coaching Hut was completed earlier in the year at minimum cost to the club and kindly sponsored by Evergreen landscapes and I.S
- 6. Received grant of €150K from Sports Capital which we hope to use for the Carmelite development.
- 7. Work completed on upgrade of clubhouse to include roof, heating,
- 8. Upgraded goalmouths in Prunty pitch in December and should be in great condition at beginning of new year.
- 9. Upgraded Hockey and All-weather pitch and now looking to achieve accreditation on AWL.
- 10. Potential AWL in Ballycullen under constant review.

Following two years of Covid restrictions 2022 allowed a return to near normal football activity. We also welcomed our new Coaching and Player Development Manager Timmy Hammersley and our new Games Promotion Officer Sean Óg Boyce. Both were familiar with Ballyboden as Timmy had previously trained with the senior hurlers and Sean Óg had spent a spell coaching at nearby St Annes GAA Club. Both were quick to negotiate their way around the club and develop a full programme of coach education and development initiatives. A coaching plan is being rolled out called "The Boden Way" which outlines a clearly defined pathway for players to progress. Coaching also resumed at nearby schools.

The highlight of the year was the Intermediate team under Donal Monaghan winning the All County Intermediate Football Championship. Three other teams contested finals, the U21A's the U19A's and the U21B team. In the last match of the season Liam Carter's Under 21B team gallantly held out against Kilmacud Crokes to win the U21F championship. On the eve of the All Ireland Football Final our new senior management team led by Kenny Naughton entered a young team in the Kilmacud All Ireland sevens competition. Seven of the panel of ten players were under 21 years of age. They were defeated by a solitary point in the quarter final. Six of these players later went on to win the All County Intermediate football championship later in the year during the course of which they defeated two division two teams. This win together with the club reaching three underage finals suggest there is significant up and coming talent within the club. Four of our minor footballers were on the Dublin football panel: Daniel Mc Carthy (joint captain), Leon Murphy, Mark McGlynn and David Quinlivan. A number of our senior players were on the Dublin senior football panel for periods throughout the season including, Shane Clayton, Cathal Flaherty, Ross McGarry, Colm Basquel, Robbie McDaid, Ryan Basquel and Kieran Kennedy. Minor coach Pat Keane was also part of the Dublin Minor Coaching Staff in 2022.

Senior Team

Kenny Naughton took up the post of senior football manager for 2022. He was assisted by Martin Masterson, Daire Walsh, Andrew Kerin and Cormac Smyth. During the course of the league opportunity was given to emerging talent and many players were given the opportunity to play senior football. Overall 50 players got game time in the league. The team won 9 league matches and were involved in three draws. This cemented their place in the top four prior to the commencement of the championship.

In the first round of the championship three players Evan Nugent, Alex Gavin and Michael McDonald made their championship debuts against Cuala in O'Toole Park. Following a ding dong battle a late point from Alex Gavin secured a draw for Ballyboden. In round two an entertaining and high scoring game; goals from Warren Egan (2) and Collie and Ryan Basquel saw Ballyboden come out on top on a score line BBSE 4-10 Ballymun Kickhams 2-11.



The prize on offer for the winners of the third round v Clontarf was a place in the guarter final. A strong all round performance from Ballyboden including a goal from Ross Mc Garry saw Ballyboden win on a score line of BBSE 1-16 Clontarf 0-7.

In the quarter final against Ballinteer St John's Ballyboden weathered an early storm and with the help of a goal from Warren Egan led by 3 points at half time. Early in the second half Warren added a second goal. Daren O'Reilly added a third which gave Ballyboden what seemed like a comfortable 8 point lead. Ballinteer St John's however rallied and closed the gap to 3 points. Substitute Conal Keaney added two late points to steer Ballyboden home on a scoreline BBSE 3-15 Ballinteer St John's 3-10.

The semi-final saw Ballyboden paired against Na Fianna. A poor performance saw the championship season come to a disappointing end. Playing against a strong wind Ballyboden only managed a single point in the first half. A strong Na Fianna performance continued in the second half. Ballyboden's handling errors did not help their efforts and they eventually lost out on a score line of BBSE 0-7 Na Fianna 1-14. Injury and emigration robbed the team of significant players during the season (Robbie McDaid and Aran Waters)

Intermediate Team - The end of a long wait!

The Intermediate team continued to show good form under the management team of Donal Monahan, Martin Murphy, Mick Maher, Brendan Young and Declan Maguire. They played in AFL Division 3 and finished mid table winning 7 matches. In the championship they were drawn against Na Fianna, St Sylvesters and Thomas Davis. They narrowly lost the opening encounter to Na Fianna but recovered well with wins over Thomas Davis and St Sylvesters. A Quarter final away against Kilmacud Crokes followed. Despite being 6 points down at half time the team rallied, supported by a passionate away crowd to win by 4-12 to 3-12.

In the semi-final Ballyboden took advantage of a strong wind to lead opponents Lucan at half time by 12 points to nil. There was no let-up in the second half where they drove on to win by 18 points to 5.

In early November after experiencing the highs and lows of league and championship football the season was to finish with a championship final against the team that had beaten us in our first championship outing, Na Fianna. Another cool day in O'Toole Park witnessed by a strong Ballyboden crowd saw Ballyboden lift an intermediate championship trophy for the first time in 51 years. Among that crowd was Noel Callan who had played in the final of 1971. Finals can be uneventful tension-ridden occasions, and this was no different. Mal Codd's goal calmed the nerves in the second half but an early bath for Colly Dunne saw us defending stoutly for the closing minutes. When the final whistle sounded it brought closure to a season that had started back in January but also closure on a 51 year intermediate championship drought.

The Junior A Team were under the management of Tony Duffy. Richie Connell and Tadhg Cashman. This was their first year playing in Division 5 of the League. During the course of the year the management team utilised 62 different players in 15 league games. This was this team's first year in Division 5. They finished prominently in 7th position winning 7 matches. They were also involved in two draws.

In the championship they were narrowly beaten by Kilmacud in a thrilling encounter in PUM. This showed clear progress as the same team had defeated Ballyboden by 10 points at the same stage of the championship two years earlier.

They had emerged from a strong group which included Erin's Isle and Round Towers Clondalkin. The team continue to play a nice brand of football and have made significant progress in a short space of time.



The Junior B Team were again led by Donal Griffin and Paul Dolan. They played in Division 7 of the league and finished mid table winning eight games.

In the championship they were paired with Naomh Mearnog, Ballymun Kickhams and St Margarets. They lost to Naomh Mearnog but following wins over Ballymun Kickhams and St Margarets they progressed to the quarter final where they enjoyed a fine 3-8 to 0-12 win over Lusk. A fourth Championship semi-final loss in a row means that the quest for Championship success for this team continues. However, with continued player dedication, the experience gained by the panel over the last number of years together with continued infusion of players from Minor ranks augurs well for the future.



Senior B

senior B had the busiest of all the calendars as they started out with 4 games in the Leinster League competition where they performed well only to be beaten at Semi Final stage by Danesfort. In the League Cup competition, they performed well to finish mid table winning 4 out of 7 in the Inter A competition (where most other teams are the first team from their clubs)

They started off well in Championship with 2 hard fought wins. The last group

game was defeat in miserable conditions to put them into a Semi-final against Peregrines who were just too strong, boasting as they did a couple of Dublin players in their ranks but overall lots of matches and lots of camaraderie among the group made it an enjoyable year for all.

Senior C Junior 2 Camogie 2021

For the 3rd year in a row, Junior team made the Championship final. Having won the Junior 3 competition in 2021, they made the final again in 2022 only to lose by a single point to Good Counsel.

Earlier in the year they had performed well in the league competition winning 5 out of their 7 games. The team was a blend of youth and experience with a number of minor players coming through to make up the panel. The numbers weren't there to make up a 4th Senior Team in 2022.



U21 Camogie

After a long season juggling camogie and football for a lot of players, there was question mark about whether the U21 competition should be entered at all. The competition started at the end of October after the adult and minor seasons were finished. Finally, a group of willing players was assembled, and 2 teams were entered. The A-team performed well in the 3-team division 1 group, but a draw and a narrow defeat was not enough for them to proceed.

The B-team finished runners up in their group and faced into a stiff challenge against some strong A teams in the knockout stages.

However, 2 outstanding performances saw them going all the way to win the Division 3 Championship





Minor

The Minor A's competed in Championship- with a small division 1 group and withdrawals from that along the way, they only played one match before a semi-final.

In order to get some more competitive preparation for both Semi-final & Final, they travelled further afield with 2 useful challenge matches in Kilkenny. After winning their home semi-final, they came up against Lucan in the final in Abbottstown.

A storming start saw them build up a 10-point lead in the first half but they were reeled in by Lucan who equalised with a minute left only for our girls to win it with a last minute goal to take the Minor Championship.

It wasn't long before "The Boden Braves" started their first training session on Sancta Maria pitch.

What started off as an idea has developed into a brilliant initiative supported by Bollyboden St Enda's and the community. The Boden Braves are growing and growing each week. Training takes place on a Monday evening from 6.30 – 7.30pm for children under 18 years of age. The older players take part in 30 minutes hurling training and 30 mins football training. Our younger group takes part in playground games and some hurling and football games. This year, the Boden Braves took part in two exhibition matches at half time in the senior football league match against St Vincent's and at half time in the Hurling League game against Ballinteer St John's.

This was a fantastic experience for the team, parents, and supporters. After the excitement of the matches – The Braves, along with athletes from Pearse Brothers Athletic Club, visited our neighbouring club, Knocklyon United FC. The Intermediates, fresh from their promotion after winning the 2021 Junior A Champions, had an almost total change in personnel as they approached the new season. Consolidation was the plan for both league Division 4 and Inter Championship. A new management team greeted a much-changed squad and they somewhat surprised themselves by serving up a series of very fine performances in a strong league campaign with 9 wins out of 11 games. The highlight of the year was the impressive performance in the league play-off final against a Na Fianna team that had beaten them comfortably in the league and ply their trade two championships above. The Junior B's played in Division 6 of the Go Ahead League this season in which they recorded 7 wins. 3 losses and 1 draw and missed out on a possible promotion by 1 point. After reaching the Junior C county final last year, the team had achieved promotion to Junior B but they initially struggled as they found life there was very competitive. They lost the first 3 games but they then regrouped and won their last 2 games to avoid a relegation play-off. The team signed off on the 2022 season on 11th September with a 5-point win against St. Judes. The record in their championship was 3 losses and 2 wins.

The Under 19A team played in Division 1 and the U19A Championship. Results were mixed in Division 1 with many A panellists unavailable for every game for a variety of reasons. The team won 6 of their 8 fixtures. This included 2 walk-overs. In the Championship, we beat Naomh Barróg but defeats by Kilmacud and Raheny meant that we didn't progress out of our group

Our second team were pitched in the South section of league Division 3 and the B Championship. In Division 3, the team actually only played 4 out of total of 9 games; receiving FIVE walkovers from teams which pulled out in the remaining 5 games.

Coaching and Games

2022 was a big year for Coaching and Games in the club with the appointment of Coaching and Player Development Manager Timmy Hammersley and Games Promotion Officer Sean Óg Boyce.





Both began their roles in early May and on

Wednesday the 1st of June they were launched in the club hall at a well attended and energetic evening. It included a panel discussion with Players and Coaches Louise Kelly, Conal Keaney, Hannah Hyland and Tommy Keogh along with major contributions by Chairperson Donagh O'Farrell and Head of the Coaching Committee Paudie O'Neill. The evening itself proved invaluable in introducing both Timmy and Sean Óg to club members along with outlining their main priority areas for the year ahead.

Ever since the Launch Night a full programme under the guidance and oversight of the new Coaching Committee has been rolled out and they include:

Coach Education and Recruitment

The Education and Recruitment of Coaches is a key focus area of the Coaching Team. It has encompassed a number of areas in the club such as: • Good Practice Workshops - Hall and Pitch: Over June and July we ran a number of Good Practice Workshops that were conducted in the Clubhouse Hall. The workshops were held from Boden Óg/Academy - U19 and were conducted to reinforce good practice coaching along with facilitating collaboration among our coaches.

The follow up to this was held over the month of November where workshops were transferred to Sancta Maria. Games based sample sessions with groups of children/young people were run by both Timmy and Sean Óg with assistance from coaches and members of the Coaching Committee. The success of this workshop series can be measured by the attendance of 220 coaches over the four weeks.

- ICGG- The ICGG (Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games) has recently replaced the Foundation Course and in October two courses were conducted over three evenings in Colmcille's Primary School by Paudie O'Neill and Teresa Molohan.
- 45 new mainly Boden Óg / Academy Coaches gained their qualifications. We are lucky to be able to utilize the experience of two great Coach Educators such as Paudie and Teresa. We will be running more ICGG Courses in late January / early February with dates to be announced in the new year.
- Safeguarding-Similar to the ICGG, Child Safeguarding courses were held over October/ November and former GPO Paul Mcloughlin acted as Lead Facilitator. 70 coaches attended in total and added Safeguarding Courses will be held in the new year as it is a core requirement for the coaching of Children/Young People.




The Communities of Practice initiative will be rolled out in 2023 with all of the clubs sections and it will be a regular feature throughout the year. The aim of it is to increase collaboration and cohesion among all of the coaches in each code from u15- Senior towards the development of a player pathway and the identification of common principles to guide our coaching of teams. It is envisaged that coaches in each section will meet every quarter over the year.

The daily schedule of camp participants entailed fundamental games, football and hurling/camogie skill sessions, matches and a variety of fun games.

Coordinating the three training venues includes a vast number of dynamic challenges. However, new and old volunteers meeting each other, working together and creating team bonds and friendships is highly rewarding. Without the help of lead coaches Alan Ryan, Paul Phillips and Deirdre McGillicudy from Cherryfield, Anton Hegarty, Colm Reid and John Crowley from Knocklyon Park, Padraic Doyle, Cormac Hayes, Andrew Minch and Jane Hogan from the Hermitage, the running of weekly sessions would be far less

The mix of parents and TY's creates a

fantastic learning and dynamic team environment for our players and coaches.

Bringing our three training venues together can be rare and challenging. With the much appreciated help of St. Colmcille's Junior and Senior National Schools, this has been possible when we have had no pitches to train on.

We would like to also thank **TJ O'Mahony** for their continued support and for being present at the launch of our new name, **Boden Óg**. This was announced at the club's first ever Popup Gaeltacht, which is fitting considering the strong presence of Gaeilgeoirí amongst our players and coaches.

This name is also an accurate representation of our aims; Fun learning with emphasis on fundamental movement skills and an introduction to our Gaelic Games.



Schools - Primary

Re-establishing a Ballyboden St Enda's presence within our surrounding schools was a top priority once the new school term began. Although the school coaching program is primarily the main remit of the club GPO, carrying out the program requires a number of helping hands.

A number of club volunteers have been influential in representing and promoting Ballyboden St Enda's in the local primary schools. Without the help of experienced coaches Paul Waters and Paudie O'Neill, the children of Ballyroan B.N.S. and Gaeilscoil Chnoc Liamhna would not have had any formal GAA classes this school term.

A huge thank you is also owed to club volunteers Padraic Doyle and Jemma Hayes. Both have vast experience as summer camp coordinators and as Boden Óg lead coaches. Padraic and Jemma have represented Ballyboden St Enda's in Scoil Carmel N.S. Scoil Naomh Padraig G.N.S. and Loreto Grange Road Primary School.

The additional help from club volunteers has been a fantastic foundation for our new school coaching program. Those who have played a part in flying the Ballyboden St. Enda's flag are an example to other members who may be of similar demographic. Recently retired coaches or 3rd level students with flexible timetables. This is the demographic of volunteers that can be of major influence to the club and our local schools.

Schools - Secondary

Working with and upskilling Transition Year students in Secondary Schools has for a long period been an important part of coach recruitment in the club. This has continued again with a predominant focus in 2022 on Colmcilles Secondary School. The young people were brought through three weeks of Coach Education work and they then engaged in an after school project with Colmcille's Primary School. Here they coached Football to fourth class children for a number of weeks and many of them have since started assisting with sessions on a Saturday morning with Boden Óg. A similar TY project will be rolled out over 2023 in Colaiste Eanna and Scanta Maria.



Freetaking / Goalkeeping Summer Project

During the summer months of July and August we held a summer Goalkeeping / Freetaking project. It focused on the ages of u12-14 and u15-16 and included both Goalkeeping and Freetaking for both boys and girls in Gaelic Football and Hurling/Camogie. The sessions were conducted by

both Adult players and Coaches from within the club. Conor O'Donoghue, Finn McGarry, Mattie Nolan, Darragh Gogan, Sarah O'Brien and Paul Waters led the Goalkeeping, while Louise Kelly, Andy Kerin, and Timmy Hammersley ran the Freetaking.

The aim of the sessions was to give tools to the children/young people who were attending, while at the same time upskilling Coaches so that Goalkeeping and Freetaking work can be integrated into their training sessions. Each team was requested to nominate at least one player and in total nearly 100 players and 50 Coaches attended. The follow on from this will be the formation of a Goalkeeping and Freetaking Academy with workshops to be conducted over the year.



Coach Survey and Values Evening

As a prelude to a Values themed Evening we ran a club wide Coaching survey. The goal of the survey was to get a general sense of our Coaching demographics, along with what Coaches feel is working well for them, and any areas where additional support may be needed. Huge thanks to Cathal Ryan who put together the survey along with collating the results. In total 230 Coaches participated and some of the main findings include:

- Under-representation of Females at coaching in comparison to playing
- Heavy reliance on parents to act as coaches
- Encouraging and promoting enjoyment, fun and love of the games

Coaches would value more support in the areas of:

- Practical and online coach education
- Clarification of policies on streaming, rotation, playing time (values & The Boden Way)
- Better availability of equipment notably pitches / team training time slots
- Best practice sharing / coach-to-coach knowledge sharing

On Monday the 7th of November we held a Coach Values themed evening in the Clubhouse. The evening was based on a theme of active participation and we utilized the GAA values as a means to discuss the actions which Coaches feel are relevant to their everyday Coaching practices. The preparation and facilitation of the evening was ably assisted by John Kirwan and Carol Donahy along with Donogh O'Farrell, Paudie O'Neill and Sean Óg. Over the two Workshops 280 Coaches across all our age groups



attended and over time will be increasing the visibility of values around the club, along with including them in our updated Coaches Handbook.

Structures and Policy:

- Coaching & Games Committee (Coiste Oiliúna agus Cluichí): Alongside the CPDM and GPO appointments, May 2022 also saw a re-establishing of a Coaching Committee within the club. The Coiste encompasses members from all of the individual sections within the club, both adult and juvenile and they work to oversee all elements of Coaching and Games. The group is chaired by Paudie O'Neill and members include Sorcha Farrelly, Carol Donaghy, Caoimhe Ni Neill, Teresa Molohan, Deborah Heavey, Mattie Weldon, Collie Dunne, Naoise Maguire, Tony Dunne and Darren O'Reilly. The group met five times over 2022 and each member is working on specific areas of focus. Thanks for all of their time and effort.
- Handbook and Code of Conduct: We are currently working on updating the mentors Handbook which will include all the main details associated with Coaching a team. The Handbook will also include a Code of Conduct which all mentors will be required to sign.
- Athletic Development: In the off season a full review of Athletic Development within the club was carried out. A new revised programme was developed and over 2023 all teams in all codes from u13 up will have access to periodised and structured Strength and Conditioning Coaching.
- Ratification and closed season: On Friday the 9th of December a closed season was announced for training in the club until the 21st of January. This is to allow a proper rest period for both Players and Coaches along with facilitating appropriate planning for the year ahead. Concurrently a structured ratification process is now in place. Mentors who want to go forward as a Coach are requested to give an update on their Coach Education status. Based on this the Coaching Team will then initiate a planned series of Coach Education programmes for the coming year.
- Female involvement: On Wednesday the 19th of October a Sub Committee of the Coiste held a Female Participation Forum in the Club. The Forum looked at both the barriers to Female participation which exist in the club, along with the opportunities which are there to overcome such barriers. A number of recommendations came from the forum and the ambition is to enact these over the coming year.

The Senior League was an overall success winning 8 and drawing 1 of the 11 games played, with notable wins against Thomas Davis (3.11 to 1.15) at home and away to Foxrock Cabinteely (3.13 to 1.17). The ladies finished 4th out of 12 teams.

Pitted in a strong group which included 2021 county finalists Na Fianna and Foxrock Cabinteely, the ladies failed to perform in home games against St. Sylvesters and Na Fianna. A good performance however in the relegation final v Clanna Gael secured Senior Championship for 2023. The silver lining of the year was the introduction of 5 players from our successful minor squad who all acquitted themselves extremely well so we look forward to 2023 with great optimism.



Senior B Ladies

2022 was a successful year for the Ladies B Team ending the season as runners-up in Division 3 League, and finalists in the Cup. While it was a rewarding year, it was also a very challenging one. Promotion to Division 3 meant the team were playing at a higher level against many clubs' first teams while also without key players from the previous year with some promoted to the A team, others emigrated, moved for work or were injured.

The training was well attended with the players showing great commitment with the B and C team training together until August when the Championship started.



The League started with a comfortable win over St Judes (2021 All Ireland Junior Champions) followed by six wins and 2 defeats. The County Board determined this year that only 1 team would be promoted to Division 2. A mere panel of 18, player availability was further reduced with work commitments, travel and exams so it proved difficult to get 15 players out each week. Help from the Senior section and Minor B's ensured the team was able to compete. Competing in Division 7 in League and Cup competitions proved challenging as did the Championship.

A great bunch of players, the ladies turned up whenever available and had great fun.

The ladies continued to train until the end of November and look forward to a better 2023.

In its 2nd year of existence, the Senior E team competed in the League, Cup and Championship, reaching the Junior J Championship Shield Semi Final. While silverware still eludes the Senior E's, the panel continued to grow throughout the season and by year end totalled 31 players.

The growing panel size was not sufficient however to guarantee player numbers for matches. The opportunity for players to travel, together with part time jobs, meant that again this year the team relied heavily on the Minors and U16s to field teams for most fixtures.

The Ladies Adult Football committee held a think in session in the Club in October. The aim of the morning was to review Ladies football in Ballyboden St Enda's and plan for 2023. Nominated players from each of the 5 adult teams were invited to take part in addition to the teams' management.

A workshop followed a series of short talks delivered by Ladies committee member and mentor Deborah Heavey, Senior A Ladies manager Stephen Maxwell and Timmy Hammersley, our CPDM. Discussions were around the positives from 2022, improvements for 2023, regrading, protocols around returning to play after injury & extended absence, standard of coaching, the dual player amongst other topics. Results from a player survey, which was conducted ahead of the forum, was presented to the group. The purpose of the survey was to see how players are feeling about football and our club, the aim of which was to











give a clear understanding of where the section is at the moment and what positive changes need to be made going forward. The survey was well received with a high participation rate. A lively debate ensued where ideas were fleshed out and developed on.



On October 23rd, a Sunday afternoon in Sancta Maria, our U16A footballers took to the field to contest the Division 1 Championship Final against long-time adversaries Naomh Jude in a fitting swansong for both groups of players who have been the fiercest of rivals since they first met in Go Games at U9 and at every game since. And now they met for one last game as juveniles: the Division 1 Championship Final.

This was an epic encounter – a huge crowd lined the pitch as the 2 heavyweights traded blows, - with Judes stretching into a first half 3-point lead only for Boden's Emma Moran and Emma Fogarty to respond just before the break to bring Boden back to within a point. More of the same in the second half as both teams traded goals and crashed off the woodwork at both ends. A breathless final 15 minutes saw the score see saw between the 2 teams before Boden finally



ran out 3-point winners in a titanic and exhausting encounter.

Fast forward to November 26th and one of the last matches of the year: our U15C camogie team lined up against the Shankill 'A' selection for the Division 6 Championship final played out in the gloom and cold of wintry Shanganagh Cliffs. It was a strong Shankill team with a couple of Dublin development girls in their ranks, so our U15s – bolstered by the U14s that made fielding this team possible all year – knew they were up against it, as they had lost to Shankill in the league. This time unfortunately, the game didn't go our way, and Shankill eventually ran out deserved winners, but all around the pitch the Boden girls put in heroic performances in the face of superior firepower with an inspiring display of courage and determination right to the final whistle, including an eye-catching performance from Anna Connor in midfield, and a tour de force from embattled cúlbarra Jen Keogh in the Boden goal.

These epic stories of winning and losing were repeated throughout the age groups as we entered the last weeks of October and into November – but with a common thread running through all of them – the effort and bravery of the girls- every girl who pulled on a Boden shirt in 2022 did so for their friends and their team-mates and every one of them went out, put themselves on the line, and did their best.

Phenomenal Growth of Juvenile Ladies Football and Camogie

During 2022, **seven hundred and twenty-seven girls** - from U16 down to U9 – were registered to play for Ballyboden St Endas in 68 teams (36 football and 32 camogie). Numbers at training were also consistently high across the board, with 70 plus players not uncommon on the hockey and all-weather pitches in Sancta Maria, while many teams reported a growth in numbers as the year progressed, finishing the year with the same or more girls than when they started in January. The success and popularity of the girls' games continues to go from strength to strength both in the club and in the county.

On the Field of Play

And all the hard work by the girls has brought a lot of success, with Boden competing in 17 finals, whether Championship, Shield or Féile. Leading the way in their final year in 'juvenile' were the afore mentioned 2006 girls: Division 1 Dublin Championship winners in both football and camogie, as well as Division 1 league winners in football, while the U16Bs won the Division 7 Championship in football and the Division 5 Shield in Camogie.

At U15 in football our Cs were crowned Division 10 Champions, while our U15A footballers made it to the final of Féile. All three U15 camogie teams contested Championship finals in Divisions 1, 4 and 6, while our U15B camogie won the Dublin Division 6 Féile and were Shield runners up in the subsequent National Féile.

Lotto Report 2022

The Lotto remains a vital source of income for the club, and it's estimated to have contributed almost €40,000 to club funds in 2022. Through consistent promotion on the club website and social media channels, we were able to achieve a small increase in the overall number of Lotto members – we now have just over 530 annual and monthly subscribers.

The Jackpot was won on 8 occasions throughout the year - one more that the 7 Jackpots won in 2021. In March the first Jackpot of the year- €4,000 - was won by Ann Quinn, and John Burns won a €2,500 Jackpot in April. Brian Bobbett was our next winner, with another Jackpot of €2,500 in May. June was a big month for Jackpot wins!! First up was Cormac Smyth (€2,000); then a €1,000 Jackpot shared by Philip Butler and James & Lucinda Enright. The third June Jackpot win went to Sheila Byrne (€1,500). We then had to wait until September, when the biggest Jackpot of the year- €7,000- was won by Vivian Ruddy. Most recently in December, Fergal O'Reilly won €6,000.

So far this year (2022), €26,500 has been paid out in Jackpot winnings, In addition, there were over 100 Lotto members who were winners in the weekly Match First Three prize, who won amounts varying from €40 to €300. Overall, including the weekly Match Three prizes, the Lotto gave out over €40,000 in total prize money to Lotto members so far in 2022. Early in the New Year, we plan to change the system that is used to administer and run the weekly Lotto draws, and we hope this will help us to better promote the Lotto draws, allow people play the Lotto on a weekly basis, and provide updates to the Lotto members on the results of the draws.

Football



After a number of difficult years for Súiltóirí Buadáin due to Covid 19, we were eventually able to return to our full activities in 2022. We were back to our normal schedule of 2 walks each Saturday morning – a challenging hill walk, normally of around 4 hours, and a second shorter and flatter walk of around 2 hours. With an increased interest in outdoor activities due to Covid 19, we experienced a big surge in interest in joining Súiltóirí Buadáin during 2021 and 2022. While we were able to take in a number of new members, we continue to be restricted in further increasing our membership due to the limited number of experienced guides we have in the group. In the coming year we will be seeking to address this issue and hopefully this will allow us to take in more new members from the ever-increasing waiting list of individuals seeking to join the group.



During 2022 we often had more than 30 people on any given Saturday for our challenging hill walks. We met at 8.30 at the club and covered numerous beautiful treks across the Dublin and Wicklow mountains. To name just a few of our walks in 2022 we trekked the Spinc in Glendalough, Djouce, Tinnahely, Lough Braes, Lugnaquilla, Maulin, Camaderry and the Howth Cliff Walk. There is also interest every Saturday in our shorter walks. These include the Hell Fire Club, Kilmashogue, Cruagh Wood, Boharnabreena waterworks and a loop of Marley Park and St. Endas Park. Every month or so we continue to have a Walk for All which is generally a flat walk of around 3 hours which allows all our members to join together on the same walk. While the purpose of the club is to provide members with the opportunity to get exercise while enjoying the beauty of our hills and mountains, there is another very important aspect to our weekly walks. The walks provide the opportunity for social interaction, developing new friendships and the very welcome tea and scones at the end of each walk.

There is of course much more to Súiltóirí Buadáin than our weekly Saturday walks in Dublin and Wicklow. We have always looked to broaden our horizons both within Ireland and abroad. Since 2013 we have experienced some lovely trips in Ireland such as the Black Valley in Kerry and the 12 Bens in Connemara as well as some fantastic walking trips across Spain, Italy, Austria and Croatia. With the travel restrictions imposed due to Covid 19 we were curtailed in our trips during 2020 and 2021 but thankfully in 2022 we were able to resume our travels. In June we had a group of 50 who travelled to Tralee and we enjoyed 2 great days walking on the Dingle Way. We first walked from Dunquin to Ventry where coffee and scones were laid on for us when we arrived at Páidí O' Sé's pub in Ventry. Our second walk took us from Camp to Annascaul finishing up in Tom Crean's pub for refreshments. Needless to say, the ceol agus craic in the evenings was a big feature of the trip. In the first week of September a group of 49 travelled to Mayrhofen in the Austrian Alps for a fantastic week of hill walking and other activities. The ski lifts allowed us to start our walks at a height of around 2000 metres and the views were absolutely stunning. The hotel, the food, the facilities and the entertainment were all of the highest standard. As well as the hill walking, the other activities enjoyed by the group included cycling trips on electric bikes, trips to Innsbruck and to nearby glaciers. It was great to get back to these trips after the difficult Covid years.



Another activity that we missed for a few years was our annual Christmas party. We got back to normal ways with a fantastic party above the Yellow House at the beginning of December where we had almost 60 people dining and dancing the night away. We now look forward to continuing the success of the group in 2023. We hope to be able to take in more new members to enjoy our weekly walks and work is already underway planning for our trips in 2023.


