Boden's Minor A Hurlers stay on full points, two wins from two. A fruitful second half, built on the back of good application and teamwork, preserved Boden's 100 percent record in the Minor A Hurling League at a pleasantly warm Firhouse Road on Sunday at noon. The home side gave themselves plenty of close-out opportunities after dominating the middle third of the field over the thirty minutes. The visitors will ponder on the reasons for their own second thirty after they gave as good as they got for the opening half. The result has Boden on four league points and well set up for the season ahead.

Lucan opened the brighter and in Emmett Allen they had a match winner from placed balls and general play. He showed why the Dublin selectors have him in their sights for county honours; he is currently in the under 17 development squad. Aaron Coffey opened Boden's account after good work by Aiden Mellett, but Allen was the name on most spectator's lips after three strikes in a row. Cillian Byrne got onto some good ball and each time he found Ciaran Ryan who evaded strong defending to find the target. 3 to 3. Allen again pointed after some sloppy defending on Boden's forty, but the response was swift, Coffey winning a

'nothing' ball on the wing before finding Mikey Dunne free for a strike to the onion-sack. Within a minute Dunne found the tallest man on the park Eoin Monahan, free and with only two defenders and the goalman to beat! He was unceremoniously downed to the turf and the resultant penalty was slightly miss- hit for a point. This sequence of play was the trigger for Lucan to show their best side, Allen and Ciaran Dowling bagging a series of points and creating a couple of goal chances to boot. Boden kept in touch through Mellett and Conor Barton, full of confidence after last season's heroics and his side's capture of the Minor B Championship. Half time had it 1.7 to 11 in favour of the visitors.

The second half was Boden's, from the shot stopping of goalman Conor O'Donoghue, through the central spine of Luke Corcoran, Byrne, Michael O'Brien and Barton and up to the towering figure of Monahan, the overall performance was well ahead of the Lucan boys. Coffey showed neat touches with a tasty point and a well placed shot for a goal, after Barton had done the hard work. Ryan and Barton added further to Lucan's pain before Byrne found the rangy number 11, a third goal for Boden. The gap was now eight points and the cushion allowed Boden some comfort over the remaining minutes. Lucan went after goals and tried to find Allen in space. They got their just reward with a late consolation three pointer, Eoin Lombard the finisher after persistent attacking on the Boden 13 metre line. Boden will be mindful of the bigger challenges ahead but somewhat happy with the workrate across the numbers.

Not since 1171 AD when our nearest neighbours landed an invasion fleet on the shores of Waterford has such a determined group of boys ventured deep into the Deise county. Destination Ballygunner GAA, home to one of the strongest hurling clubs at all levels in County Waterford, if not in Munster.

The hurling on display was fast, physical, tough, frenetic at times and played at a level of intensity unfamiliar to our boys. However, after a slow start they quickly adapted to the pace, and although scores were hard to come by, they battled on to grind out some of the best goals and points seen on the day. The Ballygunner boys were a highly skilled and well trained outfit and showed our boys the standard of hurling that we are working towards. Having played two matches each, all the boys were exhausted at the final whistle but happy knowing they had made their club and county proud of their efforts.

Afterwards, the BBSE lads showed that they were more than a match for the opposition when it came to attacking the trays of sandwiches, buns, chocolates and other assorted refreshments laid on by the host club. All of the boys, coaches, parents and travelling fans deeply appreciated the wonderful hospitality and friendship shown by the Ballygunner club. 1916 - The World of Yesterday



Writing in 1942, the Austrian novelist Stefan Zweig commented "If today, thinking over it calmly, we wonder why Europe went to war in 1914, there is not one sensible reason to be found, nor even any real occasion for the war."

Son of well-to-do Jewish parents, Zweig was enjoying a "summer more luscious, more beautiful." than had been experienced for some years in the spa town of Baden near Vienna when news broke of the assassination of His Imperial Highness Franz Ferdinand and his wife Sophie in Sarajevo, capital of modern day Bosnia-Herzegovina. In his work "The World of Yesterday", Zweig wrote "The unexpected news passed from mouth to mouth. But to be honest, there was no special shock or dismay to be seen on the faces of the crowd, for the heir to the throne had not by any means been popular......Two hours later there was no sign of real grief to be seen. People were talking and laughing, later that evening musicians performed in the cafes again."

Although the assassination took place in Bosnia, neighbouring Serbia was accused of

collusion and the Austria-Hungary authorities issued a series of ultimata to that Government. All were met by the Serbian Government except one – they refused to allow an Austrian commission of enquiry on their territory. Thus on 28 July, 37 days after the assassination in Sarejovo, Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia and because of a global network of power alliances – the theatre of activity engulfed the continent involving by the end of 1918, thirty-three countries with a combined population of 1.8bn or 80% of total world population at the time. The invasion of Belgium by Germany, allies of Austria-Hungary, brought Britain and Ireland into the conflict which would involve 65m troops, destroy three empires, lead to 20m military and civilian deaths and 21m wounded. The devastating impact of new technology in terms of machine guns, aircraft, armoured vehicles and chemical warfare brought a scale of destruction never before experienced in war.

For those who grew up in the Ireland of the 20th century, little was known about or spoken of the Irish who fought and fell in Flanders Fields and elsewhere. Yet 50,000 Irish men died serving in British and other armies out of 200,000 who participated. In "acclaimed" histories of Ireland in the 20th century including "Ireland since the Famine by FSL Lyons", "The Course of Irish History edited by TW Moody" and the "Modernisation of Irish Society by Joseph Lee" – there is not a word of these enormous casualties.

The centenary of the Easter Rising has raised much interesting debate and analysis with at least one noted politician saying the insurgents introduced "militarism" to the Irish Question. But militarism was very much in vogue across the continent of Europe and it didn't emanate from Ireland. Prior to World War I, it was rare to find any country that had a "Department of Defence" they all fell under the nomenclature of "Ministries of War". What message does that send? What were 200,000 Irish men doing in Belgium and France?

The war was to be the source of a deep split within the Irish Volunteers which had been formed in 1913 as a counter move to the setting up of the UVF.

In a landmark speech in Woodenbridge, Co. Wicklow, the leader of the Irish Parliamentary Party John Redmond called on volunteers to

'The interests of Ireland—of the whole of Ireland—are at stake in this war. This war is undertaken in the defence of the highest principles of religion and morality and right, and it would be a disgrace for ever to our country and a reproach to her manhood and a denial of the lessons of her history if young Ireland confined their efforts to remaining at home to defend the shores of Ireland from an unlikely invasion, and to shrinking from the duty of proving on the field of battle that gallantry and courage which has distinguished our race all through its history. I say to you, therefore, your duty is twofold. I am glad to see such magnificent material for soldiers around me, and I say to you: "Go on drilling and make yourself efficient for the Work, and then account yourselves as men, not only for Ireland itself, but wherever the fighting line extends, in defence of right, of freedom, and religion in this war".

In the region of 80% of the Volunteer Force rallied to Redmond's call.

Thankfully today, there is much more awareness and much more material available on the Irish who fought in WW1. Recent writings and documentaries like that of David Davin Power "Gallipoli: Ireland's Forgotten Heroes" have brought a balance to the story of the period.

Did you know? In 1998, President Mary McAleese unveiled an Irish Round Tower memorial to the soldiers of the island of Ireland who died, were wounded or are missing from World War I at Messines near Ieper (Ypres) in Belgium. The tower is partially built from stone from a former British Army Barracks in Tipperary and from a Workhouse near Mullingar. The design has a unique aspect that allows the sun to light the interior only on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, the anniversary of the armistice that ended the war.

In memory of the Munsters who gave their lives for freedom in the Great War. The province of Munster and the City of Cork erected this stone cross."
